Headteacher's Welcome

Dear Parents and Carers,

I cannot quite believe we have already reached the end of the Spring Term! It only seems like yesterday that we returned after Christmas on 3rd January. This school year certainly seems to be flying by! Our newsletter summarises for you a lot of what has been going on here at St Antony's over the last term. As you will see, it has been a busy time!

As I mentioned in my last newsletter, teachers have been continuing to work really hard over the past term on developing our curriculum. This work continues to review what is taught and in what order so that pupils are building up knowledge day by day, week by week and year by year. We have also spent a lot of time this term with staff continuing to develop their teaching skills, with particular focus on behaviour management, questioning and effective feedback. The work to support teaching staff will continue to be prioritised as this will only enhance further the learning experiences of children in all lessons moving forward.

We are delighted with the impact of our new rewards strategy this term and it is wonderful to see so many pupils wearing their achievement badges with such pride. It is important to us all that we do not take for granted the large majority of pupils who consistently do the right things and we feel our new approach gives pupils the acknowledgements they deserve. I look forward to seeing more pupils gain various awards, badges and prizes as the summer term unfolds.

Unfortunately, we still encounter some pupils who struggle to meet our very high expectations in regards to their uniform and behaviour and we have worked very hard to support them as well as putting in place consequences for their unacceptable choices. A school that wants to prioritise learning, has to build this on a solid culture of manners, good choices, excellent behaviour and respect – and we will not condone or ignore pupil choices that potentially would undermine this culture. I want to thank you for your support as we put in place boundaries and consequences for your child. It really does make a difference when children know adults at home are working together, in partnership, with adults in school.

As I mentioned at the Parents' Forum in January, it has been important for us to address the unkind behaviour of a small number of children towards other children. Over the last term, we have done this via various assemblies, our personal development curriculum and training for our staff on types of bullying, the impact of bullying and how to deal with it effectively. We have challenged all our pupils and our staff to proactively call out unkind behaviour between pupils via our #nobystanders campaign and this has really helped us to know far more about what is happening in our school between pupils so we can take steps to stop it happening. Whilst we still have some way to go, we are proud at the positive impact this has had in addressing issues around things like misogyny, homophobia, racism and disability discrimination.

February was an extremely busy month for our year 11 pupils as they sat mock exams in all of their subject areas. The pupils worked tirelessly in preparation for these exams; attending interventions after school, completing online learning and even mentoring each other at break and lunchtimes. Our teachers were massively impressed with the focus, determination, resilience and maturity of the vast majority of pupils and commented that 'the pupils really rose to the challenge'. Well done year 11!

In other news, after many weeks of training during cold, dark, wet evenings myself and Mr Harris (our Head of History) will be running in the Manchester Marathon on Sunday April 16th. The 26.2-mile route passes through Manchester city centre, Old Trafford, Stretford, Sale, Timperley and heads down into Altrincham before returning back via Chorlton to the Old Trafford cricket ground. If you are spectating on the day, look out for us both and give us a wave – I'm sure the encouragement would be really appreciated, especially if we are getting close to the finish!

Finally, we say goodbye to Dr Moore, our science teacher, who is leaving us at Easter. We thank Dr Moore for her service and wish her all the very best for the future.

School reopens to all pupils on Monday 17th April 2023 and we look forward to hearing about all their adventures over the Easter holiday.

May I take this opportunity to wish all pupils and parents a very happy and holy Easter.

Changes to Timings of the School Day for 2023-24

After a period of consultation with senior leaders, staff, trade union reps, some pupils, parents (via the parent forum), governors and the local primary school it has been decided that the school day for 2023-24 will be amended slightly.

The main changes will commence in September 2023 and will involve us starting at 8.45am (10 minutes earlier than we currently do) in order to ensure all lessons last for a full 60 minutes (they currently do not) and to provide pupils and staff with an additional 5 minutes at lunchtime.

Pupil Rewards Update

Pupils have been awarded a total of 86,000 Achievement Points since this year's launch in November. Celebrating pupils' positive choices, effort in lessons, helping others, attending extra-curricular activities, as well as many other achievements has led to hundreds of students receiving various rewards including bronze, silver, gold and platinum achievement badges and certificates, subject award badges and attendance awards.

Pupils from years 7, 8 and 9 who have consistently demonstrated an excellent attitude to learning have attended a rewards trip to the Playfactore in Trafford.

Year 11s have a weekly reward initiative with a different focus each week including behaviour, e-learning and attendance to period 6 support sessions; rewards include achievement points and canteen vouchers. A further 68 pupils have been invited to spend the afternoon at the Trafford centre to recognise their continued hard work, outstanding behaviour and effort in school.

Anti-Bullying Training



Just after February half term, Mr Taylor facilitated for 18 pupils to take part in a one-day anti-bullying training session run by The Diana Award. The programme, a key part of our #nobystanders approach to anti-bullying, had a strong peer-to-peer focus which enabled pupils to acquire vital skills to enable them to change the attitudes and behaviours of bullying in our school by building their confidence to address different situations, both online and off.

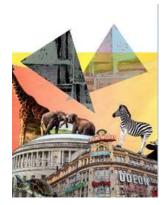
Personal Development Curriculum

We've been keeping you up to date with Personal Development learning at St Antony's through our weekly email to parents and carers, 'St Antony's Stories'. We hope that these have been informative and afforded you an opportunity to discuss current Personal Development learning with your child, in tandem with school's work on this.

To summarise, over the last term:

- the focus in Personal Development lessons over the spring term has been *Life Cycles* in half term 3 and *Keeping Safe* in half term 4;
- you've received regular communication via email of the weekly lesson content, assembly theme and other activities/events which support learning in this area of school;
- support and signposting relating to Personal Development lessons is now on the Wellbeing and Support section of the website should it be needed at any time, including when school is closed;
- there has been social media coverage to highlight some aspects of Personal Development learning; we've been sharing more thorough Personal Development lesson content with you every time a year group have a Parents'/Carers' Evening;
- we've had an internal and external review of Personal Development, and we've consulted with pupil voice about life at school (in Personal Development lessons and more widely), and listened to and actioned suggestions for improvement;
- and we've worked with *Dignify* to survey our KS4 students about online safety and behaviours and have planned a Parent Workshop for all parents and carers from 7-8pm on Thursday 11th May to help you access support for keeping your child safe in this digital age please save the date and look out for further information early in the summer term.

Art Assessments



During March students in Year 11 took part in a full art day exploring the theme of their exam. Students undertook a 5-hour exam session focusing on their chosen brief. A visiting artist Victoria Holland visited school to support Year 10 with their Manchester project. Students created work inspired by her work exploring collage and mixed media

Attendance

We know the best place for our students is in front of their teachers and the impact of "lost learning" on outcomes for students is hugely significant for their future choices and results.

The more pupils miss out on school the greater the negative impact on their learning and, ultimately, their GCSE outcomes at the end of Year 11.

At St Antony's:

- Overall attendance of pupils is just above the national average however, we want to improve this
 further and know we have more work to do
- Every students' attendance target is 98% and over.
- Persistent absence is officially classed as attendance below 90%. This means school is legally obliged to follow a formal process with these students and their families.

We ask our parents and carers that you continue to support us in reinforcing a strong attendance message to your children and encourage them to set themselves targets of being eligible for the fantastic host of rewards that recognise strong attendance such as;

- The End of Year Alton Towers reward trip
- Termly ATL / Attendance reward trips
- Student Bronze, Silver and Gold attendance badges and certificates
- Our Target week 100% attendance draws.

We hope to see as many students as possible achieving and accessing these trips and rewards in the upcoming summer term!

Safeguarding

In March we welcomed the Street Doctors into school. This is a group of medical students who worked with some Year 9 & Year 10 pupils on knife crime, emergency first aid and trauma coping.

It was an extremely positive experience, with many pupils considering it to be very informative.

A selection of Year 10 students from our GIFT Team visited St Ann's Primary School recently and worked with the children in the school. The 12 students successfully delivered a workshop to Year 6 pupils and all represented our school wonderfully whilst also demonstrating superb leadership skills. Well done everyone!

Sport Update

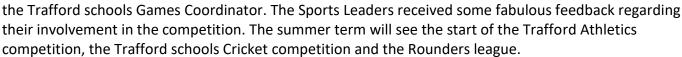

FLAME conference in London along with 8,000 young Catholics from across England and Wales. This is the largest Catholic gathering of young people in England and Wales and all pupils (along with Mrs Bartlett and Sister Linda) had a wonderful time as they embraced the theme to "rise up" and ensure they lived our faith in all that they do.

Over the last few weeks there have been a number of religious services that students have taken part in. Mr Giblin led the whole school services on Ash Wednesday, pupils have followed the Stations of the Cross in RE lessons and pupils have also had the opportunity to undertake reconciliation. This is the first time we have done this since 2019, with over 250 students choosing to take part and many pupils described the uplifting experience that this sacrament had on them.



We ended the Spring term with a whole school mass at St Hugh of Lincoln church, with Father Ged leading a congregation of nearly 700 pupils, 100 staff and a few local parishioners. The theme of the mass during this season of Lent focused on service and how we should consider using our gifts and talents for the benefit of others, not just ourselves.

Drama Club

Every Monday, Bloom Education and Tuition LTD provides a 90-minute theatre-skills activity for Years 7-10. Thirty of our students took part in their Group Acting exams this February for the Victoria College of Music and Drama, London and all who performed achieved a Distinction!
