This was related to aspects of students' lives and our value of resilience . The Parable of the Pencil was shared and words of the pencil maker became guiding principles for every pencil leaving his workshop: "There are 5 essential things to always recall as you venture into the world:				
	 You can achieve great things, but it requires guidance from others, as we can accomplish little on our own. During the sharpening process, you will experience great pain, but it will mould you into becoming a better pencil every time. Mistakes will be made, but you can erase them and learn from them. You'll bear marks and scars, but your outer casing does not determine your true value. You'll leave a mark on every surface you touch; choose to leave a positive one." 				
	Learner habits and integrity were the main content of another May assembly, along with a celebration of those who demonstrate this every day in classrooms. A reminder that opportunities to grow as a learner will always be provided here, like leading a horse to water, but that responsibility for using those opportunities lies with the students – they are owners of their learning and owners of their futures. Acting with integrity in school is the right thing to do, but it also pays off in the long term.


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hope that our students never need to use the training but we also hope that, if they do, it proves to be very valuable learning.
